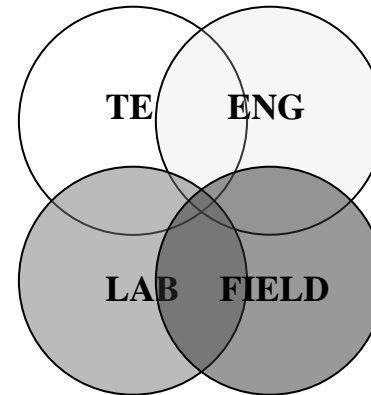

Course description:



This course complements your TE seminars, labs, and field work in focusing on writing in a variety of genres for different audiences and purposes as a means to learn about writing and the

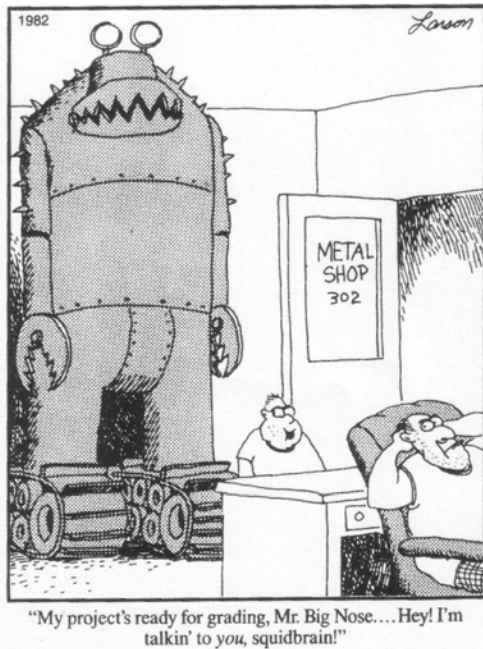
teaching of writing. As such, its focus is on inquiry—writing to learn, as well as to demonstrate learning. In it, you will write, consider the process of writing, and practice responding to writing. The course thus operates on three levels: the Writer; the Writing; and the Teaching of Writing.

Goals of this course:

- Use writing as a means of inquiry into self, texts, and the world
- Experience aspects of writing processes related to a variety of personal, expository, and research genres
- Evaluate and respond to writing for a variety of purposes

Grading policy:

Students enrolled in this class will complete four projects related to writing and writing instruction:



1. Personal Narrative (20%)
2. Textual Analysis (20%)
3. Research project (20%)
4. Portfolio (20%)

In addition, your participation will be assessed by you and me each week in terms of attendance, preparation for class, contributions to class sessions and/or peer review for an additional 20%.

Each of these projects will be explained in detail in a separate assignment sheet.

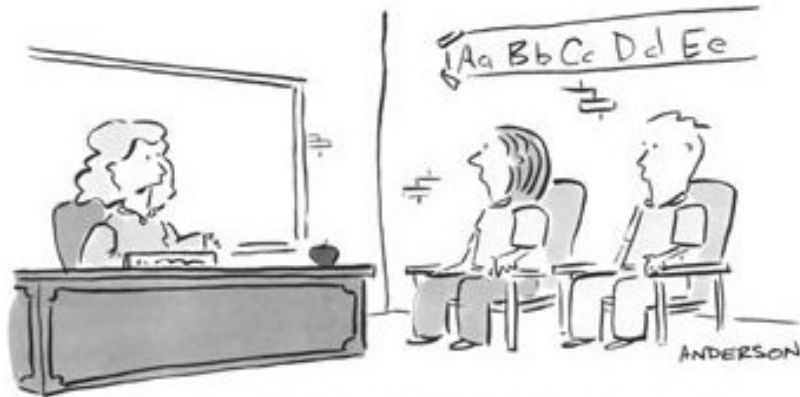
Attendance/Tardy policy:

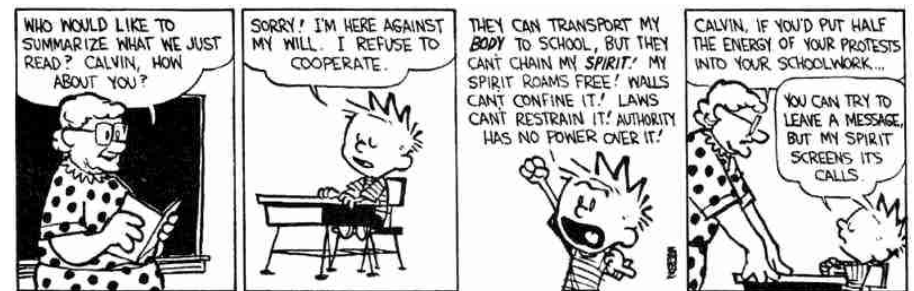
University Policies
